“SOMETHING PATRICK-AL*”**

“WE’RE HAVING COMPANY FOR DINNER ...”

Looking through old family photographs recently, [I keep “reminding” Bob about those slides he “promised” to sort out!], I found a picture of several Westbury postal employees in my parents’ dining room. Quite possibly, it was a celebration of my father being named [1944] Postmaster. Among them, an African-American life-long friend, people who worked with my father for many years, and even a few co-workers who later ran for cover when my father’s “inefficiency” [a registered Democrat in the Eisenhower era] resulted in a new Postmaster, and my father a Window Clerk.”

Judging from dishes and platters on the table, they were about to have dinner; my mother was an excellent cook and baker. [Today is her Ninety-ninth Birthday}. Identifying faces in that photo, I also thought of the work entailed in preparing that meal - sans microwave, frost-free fridge, ice-maker, or dishwasher - and for “tomorrow”, a self-cleaning oven. Given the date, perhaps World odd War II ration books would even have been involved.

Poor Martha, we sometimes think. *“It’s so much easier when Jesus visits by Himself Those Apostles! They eat like cart horses! Them? - Bring wine? That would be a first! Dishwasher? You’re looking at her! Mary! Can’t even boil water, and seems not the least bit interested in learning how!”*

Poor Mary, we muse. *“Mama did all the cooking; when she got sick, Martha just took over. I would love to help, but Martha always says that she would rather do it herself I think Martha enjoys playing “martyr”. Even after dinner, I tell Martha to relax; I’ll gladly do the dishes. But she says that she’ll have them done in no time.”*

Jesus! - a family’s guest at Bethany. How fortunate for Him that their home was a welcome respite, a place to crash and enjoy a meal- perhaps, even without the Apostles! Jesus, fully human - well understanding the sibling dynamics of Martha and Mary - and, their brother Lazarus. Jesus - appreciating Martha’s wonderful lunch or dinner, and equally glad that Mary would sit with Him. Something tells me, though, that Jesus spent more time with Martha than this Gospel seems to suggest - to thank her for a delicious meal, and to chat with her as well, spending quality time with her as he did with Mary.

What a blessing the “Marthas” among us, male and female - their no-nonsense, capable, and practical ways. Without them, we would starve! What a blessing the “Marys” among us, male and female - not helpless by a long shot! - reminding us of our need for quiet, challenging us to slow our pace on life’s “Fast Forward” Treadmill, assuring us that time spent with Jesus is always very well spent. Without them, we would starve!

Always, we must remember that Jesus is the center of this Gospel event - for more and better reasons than to “referee” Martha’s complaint when Mary played lady. Most of all, Jesus is in their home, as he must be in our homes. Remembering that, believing that - never treating Jesus as a stranger or sometime visitor, never thinking Him an intruder, our “Martha- Mary” moments are healed and reconciled. I know a family who had this little sign over their comer kitchen table: *“Christ is the head of this house, the unseen host at every meal, the silent listener to every conversation.”* Remembering that, believing that, living that, we are very well fed!

Teens@St. Pat's July 18th 16th Sunday of the Year

Reading 1: Genesis 18: 1-10

When we think of the most important values in Christian faith, we usually think of love, forgiveness, compassion, justice, honesty and a few others. But today's first reading focuses on an often forgotten value: hospitality. In the Middle East, hospitality ranks among the highest values and responsibilities. Even in war-torn areas like Afghanistan, villagers are obliged to shelter the stranger and protect their guests from their enemies. In today's first reading, Abraham, the father of Jewish faith, runs out to welcome the strangers in his midst and to offer them hospitality. As it turns out, the three strangers are messengers from God and promise him that his wife will have a child.

St. Benedict began Christian monasteries in Europe, and part of their mission was to welcome the stranger. "When a guest comes, Christ comes" was his motto. I recently got a taste of that type of hospitality. Each summer I journey to Guatemala to visit a school that we support at Holy Trinity High School. While there, I am welcomed with open arms by families of indigenous people. Although they are very poor and live in houses made of branches with dirt floors, they always find a way to serve us a meal. It is a humbling experience to say the least. They have so little and they give freely.

Hospitality means being open to a guest who is not necessarily the same as we are. It means being willing to meet new kinds of people and leave our comfort zones.

Reading 2: Colossian 1: 24-28

A masochist is someone who takes pleasure in suffering. A masochist is not well. He/she is emotionally ill. So what about St. Paul in the second reading? He says "I rejoice in my suffering for your sake". Is Paul nuts? Not at all. This is a different type of pleasure and a different type of pain. Paul is simply stating what everyone knows when they truly and deeply love another human being. Love comes with a cost. Starting with your birth, your mom had to pay a price to bring you into the world. That's the deal. Does she regret it? Not for a second. She had to get up in the middle of the night to care for you. She might have made some sacrifices to her career. She has sacrificed thousands of hours and probably driven thousands of miles for you. Why? She loves you, pure and simple. And love comes with a cost. Now it's your turn. Learn how to love. Love is not a mushy feeling. It is a deep care for another human being that can place their needs before our own. In the end, it's why we were born in the first place.

Gospel: Luke 10: 38-42

Today's Gospel continues the theme of hospitality. It is the story of two women who were friends of Jesus. Their names were Martha and Mary (the sisters of Lazarus who Jesus raised from the dead), and they have invited the Lord to join them as their guest. Martha is irritated with her sister Mary because it is Martha who is doing all the running around and serving while Mary just sat and listened to the Lord.

In a way, Martha and Mary represent two different kinds of good people. The Marthas of the world are very practical and hard-working, but overly anxious and worried. The Marys of the world are more willing to slow down and connect to people. In the world of faith, we must be willing to serve but we should realize that it is the face to face encounter with another human being that is the highest form of service. For example, when we work with the homeless men in Huntington, I am more like Martha running around making sure everything is ok, but Barbara sits with the men, eats with them, plays dominoes with them. She is being a Mary, and the Lord says that "she has chosen the better part".
