

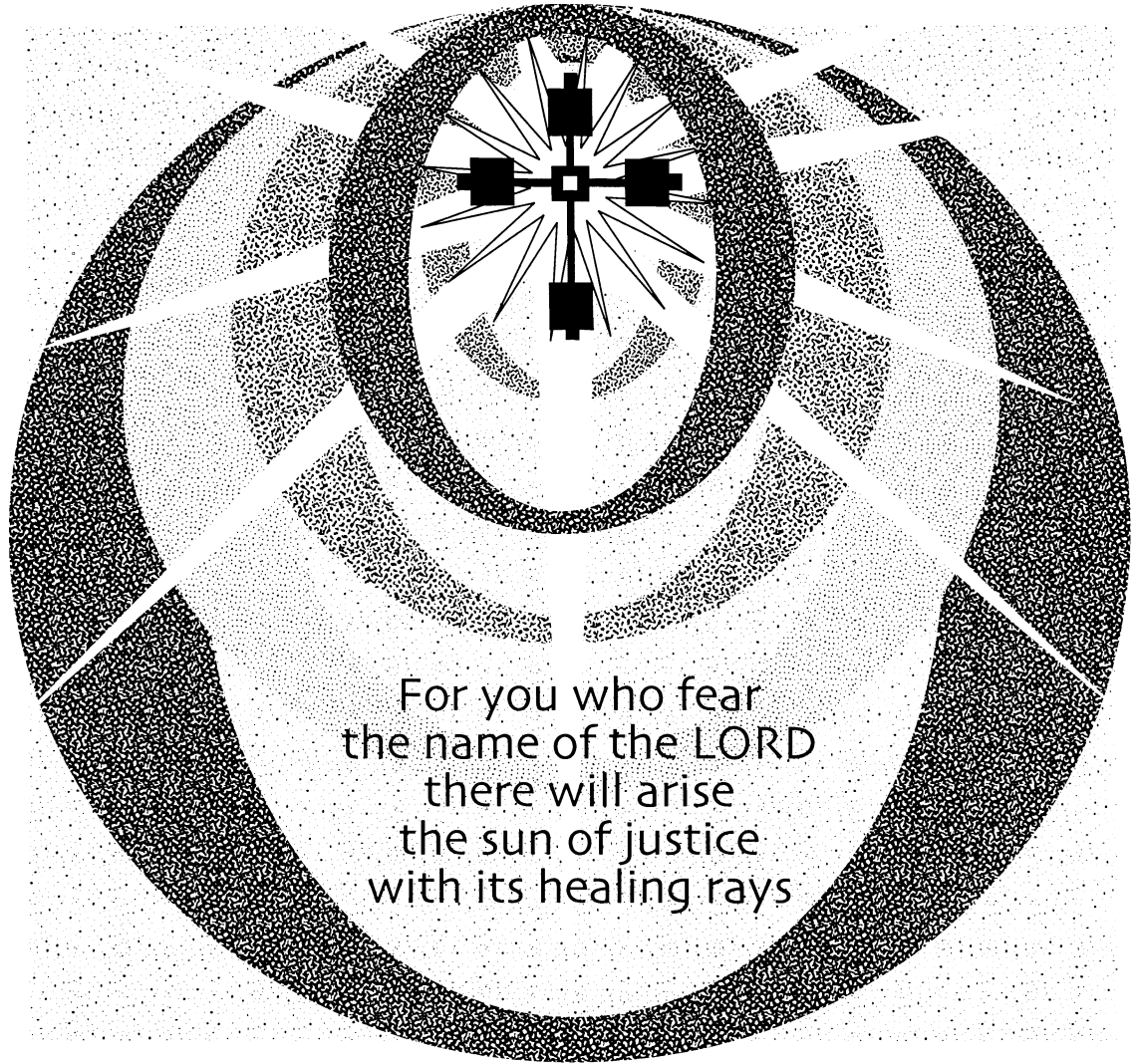

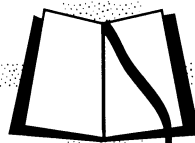

“SOMETHING PATRICK-AL**”**

JOHN CARDINAL O’CONNOR: “The Rest of the Story”

Perhaps you recall it, about three weeks ago — an ACT-UP art exhibit, favorably reviewed by *The New York Times*. One placard in the exhibit depicted John Cardinal O’Connor, “accom-panied” by a condom, and being called a name that is offensive in the extreme. You may have missed the news reports, occurring on the weekend of the Yankees’ defeat in Texas, and “Change at Jamaica!”, the L.I.R.R.’s new, state-of-the-art” switching system. New York Archbishop Timothy Dolan rightly voiced his outrage at both the poster and the *Times*’ review of the exhibit; among his comments, the conviction that no religious leader of any other faith tradition would ever be so offensively described. Let’s go further no one should be so “named” — ever! And that reminds me

Several years ago, an Eastern Suffolk Pastor asked me to visit a young man, terminally ill A.I.D. S. patient, the son of parishioners there. I telephoned first, we set a convenient time a day or two later; he said he looked forward to seeing me. We “did the necessary”, he received Holy Eucharist and the Sacrament of the Sick. As we chatted, he told me some-thing of his story — “when did he know”, whom did he tell, his wondering if God loved him, his feelings of alienation and resentment toward the Church.

He described being a patient in Saint Clare’s Hospital several times, usually in one of the specialized units caring for A.I.D.S. patients. He was especially grateful for a priest, Hospital Chaplain at Saint Clare’s, who slowly but surely helped him not only to return to the Sacraments, but also to slowly dissuage the strong feelings which he had been harboring. And then he said something like this: *“One night, shortly after I was admitted to Saint Clare’s, after my visitors had left, a nurse gave me my medication, and helped me get settled for the night. I guess I had fallen asleep, but awoke with a sense that someone else was standing near my bed. I turned on a light, and saw Cardinal O’Connor at my bed side. He emptied my bed pan, and then asked me, ‘Is there anything else I can do for you?’ I was flabbergasted! I had thought so differently of him before — stories in the press, some of his public statements, pickets at Saint Patrick’s Cathedral, things like that. He told me that he tries to visit at Saint Clare’s whenever he can, usually rather late at night. He blessed me, and told me that he is praying for me. He stopped by several other times, too, always said that he is praying for me, and gave me his blessing. Usually, he was by himself I’ll never forget how kind, gentle, and caring, he was to me.”*

When the Cardinal died in 2000, there were some brief references to his late-night stops at Saint Clare’s. Tales of such visits gave way to accounts of more “significant” events in the Cardinal’s life — Philadelphia roots, U.S. Naval Chaplaincy, sixteen or so years as Archbishop of New York. So be it... The Lord knew; some Saint Clare’s patients, their families, and staff knew. And me thinks, that is precisely how the Cardinal wanted it!

Such goodness prevails, long after an “art” exhibit’s fifteen minutes of fame — even, forever. And so, as CBS radio reporter Paul Harvey put it, *“And now you know the rest of the story.”!*

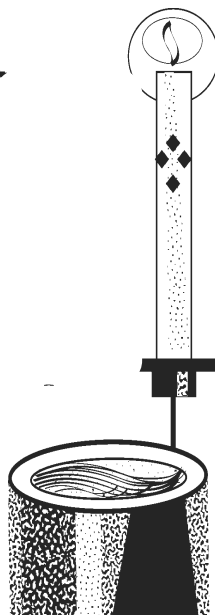

"The Street preacher and the Bible"

Reading 1 from the book of Malachi

I was in Manhattan not long ago, when I came upon a brilliant young street preacher. Not all street preachers are created equal. Many (most?) are clearly dealing with psychological problems and serious mental health issues. But not all, and this young man, maybe 25 to 30 years old, showed none of the telltale signs. He was clean, well-shaven and groomed, and good looking enough to be a model. Unlike most of the urban street prophets who are passed by thousands each day seemingly without a single one paying any notice at all, this man had a small crowd of about twenty-five grouped around him on a small island in the street. His voice seemed like it had a natural megaphone and he preached a gospel of both hope and repentance. He was not afraid to smile or look you in the eye. He quoted the scriptures extensively. Wow. A modern day John the Baptist, or Malachi, the author of our first reading today. Like Malachi, this man was preaching about the endtime. What made his message different than most street preachers was his insistence that it was not simply a time of destruction, but also one of hope. In today's first reading Malachi insists that "the day is coming, blazing like an oven, when all the proud and all evildoers will be stubble, and the day that is coming will set them on fire, leaving them neither root nor branch, says the LORD of hosts. But for you who fear my name, there will arise the sun of justice with its healing rays". The man on the corner said, "I'm only asking because I care: "Are you ready for the coming of the Lord?" Its really not a bad question at all. If the Lord were to appear today, would I be well-prepared to meet Him. What would he say to me? What would I say to him?

The responsorial psalm: "The Lord comes to rule the earth with justice"

Street preachers are usually asking whether or not you have accepted the Lord Jesus into your life. If so, you are ready for the end, if not you are dead meat. But what made this guy different was this: he insisted that what really matters is how we are treating our neighbor. "Are you ready for the coming of the Lord?" was followed by "I was hungry and you gave me to eat, thirsty and you gave me to drink, naked and you clothed me. We must take Jesus at his word: we will not enter the Kingdom without doing these things." Wow. The psalmist agrees with him today: "The Lord comes to rule the earth with justice?" What have I done on behalf of those in need? Am I ready for the coming of the Lord?

Gospel Luke 21: 5-19

The street preacher continued. He pointed to the towering buildings surrounding him and said, " I love this city. There is no better place in the world. But none of this will last forever. The only thing that lasts forever is God. And God is love. So if you would like to outlive the Empire State building, love God and love your family and love the weakest and neediest on the planet. And you will outshine the brightest lights on Broadway". Based on the Gospel this week, it seems that Jesus would agree with him: "While some people were speaking about how the temple was adorned with costly stones and votive offerings, Jesus said, "All that you see here— the days will come when there will not be left a stone upon another stone that will not be thrown down." So let's live for the things that last: faith, hope and love and let's find the Lord in all things, and especially in those who are most in need.
